Annual Report 2020



this year...

- We reached slum and village communities with a population of approximately 8000 people.
- We worked in 3 cities, across 3 states of India.
- 442 students were enrolled in our 8 small schools and one Slum Disability Centre.
- Our students came from about 1350 families.
- To do this we employed 28 local full-time staff.



In 2020 we cooked and served 237 220 meals

our vision

Through respectful relationships we focus on education, nutrition and human rights, so that individual lives are impacted, empowered and restored. We seek to bring about holistic community change and generational transformation. We seek to grow in our impact and influence in the lives of people and communities, with a goal to ultimately expand into other cities, towns and places of need.

what we do

Project Help India holistically addresses the issues facing India's poorest of the poor, the Dalits, otherwise known as the untouchables. The human rights of these people are severely challenged. These slum and village communities struggle with an under-resourced education system, drug dependence, human trafficking and domestic violence.

We offer essential early educational opportunities to children, many of whom would otherwise not go to school. They would be begging, fossicking or involved in child labour. Project Help India connects with these kids' families, providing parenting programs, counselling and guidance. We operate an education centre for children and teenagers with profound disability, a group tragically overlooked in Indian society – many disabled people would otherwise never leave their homes.

Project Help India is an entirely local enterprise. It is praised by community leaders and works closely with police and the local government to deliver social services. A local board of governance oversees all programs. Project Help India employs only local teachers, administration and support staff.

Project Help India strives to impact lives by breaking the cycle of inequity and intergenerational poverty. We do this through a number of programs, actions and initiatives including;

- education for children
- support for children and young people with disabilities
- meals and nutrition for children
- women's empowerment programs
- human trafficking education awareness programs and care for rescued children
- drug awareness programs

- counselling and social work
- training and professional development for teachers
- natural disaster emergency assistance
- youth leadership seminars
- COVID-19 crisis response
- medical and health care
- community road safety awareness

January

- We started the new year with 270 children who attended our 7 education centres.
- Our students celebrated the India Republic Day on the 26th January.

February

- Our team partnered with the Uttarakhand State Police in a state-wide program called 'Operation Smile' which aimed to rescue trafficked children. 5 young local boys were rescued.
- We provided continued support and financial assistance to families in the Kotdwara Leprosy colony.



About Operation Smile

"...At times this work was dangerous. It involved travelling long distances to cities in other states of India, following leads to locate and rescue trafficked children. Working alongside the police, Amit's role was to provide counselling to the children once they are rescued, and to assist with the process of transitioning these kids back into their homes and community. Ongoing monitoring and support continued into the future once the children are reunited with their family."

March

- COVID impacts India.
- A two week lockdown was announced on 19th March in Kotdwara and our schools were closed.
- Our COVID response included the delivery of a community educational awareness program.
- Our team sanitised slums and local colonies (residential areas).
- We started to deliver food to hungry people in the slums and to the homeless living on the streets.
- We hoped that COVID would be over by the end of the month.

April

- The COVID lockdown continued across all of April and our schools remained closed.
- Our project funds which would normally have been spent on feeding children at school, were redirected into starting a pop-up kitchen which cooked 800 meals a day.
- 400 meals are served both morning and evening = 800 meals a day at a cost of \$412¹
- Approximately 5600 people were feed each week.

- The COVID lockdown continued across May and our schools remained closed.
- We continued to feed approximately 5600 people each week.
- Our teachers monitored the wellbeing of our students and their families. School work was delivered when possible.

June

- The COVID lockdown continued across June and our schools remained closed.
- 800 people were fed each day across the month.
- Breakfast was also served to many other needy people.
- Approximately 5600 people continued to be fed each week.
- We raised awareness for 'World Refugee Day'. In 2020 there were estimated to be approximately 200 000 displaced people living in India.² Many of the Dalit people who we help are displaced and have little or no rights.
- Mental health has significantly impacted the community, and a number of suicides in the slums were reported.
- Addicts and in the slums were particularly impacted by the lockdown. Increasing domestic violence was reported.
- A local anti-drug rally was held in partnership with the local Kotdwara police (see image below).

July

- Urgent medical intervention for an ear operation was provided to Nikhil who is one of our City Centre students.
- The COVID lockdown continued across July (with some easing of restrictions) but our schools remained closed.
 Our food hand-out model is changed to the provision of ration packs to the slum areas that were barricaded by the local authorities.



We celebrated the purchase of a new house

Project Help India now has a permanent fixed address thanks to the purchase of this house. This property was paid in full (\$56,122) thanks to a special donation and a balance of excess funds. The purchase of the house means a reduction in operating expenses of \$4,000 each year currently being paid in rent.



August

- Ration packs continued to be delivered to the slums and to other needy people.
- Our students continued to work from home, and our teachers delivered work, and provided emotional support and connection where and when it was possible.
- We celebrated India's Independence Day and our team was thrilled to be recognised and honoured by politicians for their work of responding to COVID in the community (see image below).

September

- Over 1200 ration packs were delivered to slum and village centres this month.
- Schoolwork continued to be delivered by our teachers.
- We celebrated World Teachers' Day by honouring our teachers and cooks, for their phenomenal flexibility, compassion and effort in responding to the ongoing COVID crisis.
- 1200 hygiene packs were delivered to children and needy people. These contained hair oil, toothbrushes and toothpaste, sanitiser and soap (see image below).



In September we welcomed 'The Hope Society' to our story

Across September and October our Australian supporters generously responded to an urgent need by helping a suffering community in the city of Chandigarh, in the state of Punjab. The HOPE Society, a registered NGO with the Indian Government, was going to be closed due to the impact of COVID on their supporter donor base. We feared for the 173 children and their very poor families who are dependant on the Hope for their education, meals, and relational support, especially during the COVID crisis. For \$3000AU a month we supported a school in Village Singha Devi³ (97 students), a school in Village Maluwala⁴, District Ferozepur (75 students) and the team that oversees other the activities and broader administrative functions of the HOPE Society. This support has continued into 2021.



October and November

Across October, the easing of COVID restrictions allowed us to gather in small, socially distanced groups, for student lessons, teacher training, and for celebrating and raising awareness of important community issues.

We discovered during the year that an ear drum infection was not only going to cause permanent deafness, but the infection was beginning to impact his skull and brain. We were so pleased to see the smile on his face.







December

We celebrated World Environment Day with lessons and a tree planting program in the jungle villages.

We finished the year with 442 children enrolled in our 9 Education Centres.

- We gave Christmas gifts warm sweaters to each of our 270 students in Kotdwara and Bijnor.
- We gave Christmas gifts to all our teachers and we of course we had a wonderful Christmas party.


A family in Village Parmawala required emergency assistance after their house burnt down.
